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Acid Attack Volunteer Public	 Make sure that the area around the casualty is safe. Wear gloves to prevent you coming into contact with the chemical. If the chemical is in powder form, it can be brushed off of the skin. Flood the burn with water for at least 20 minutes to disperse the chemical and stop the burning. Ensure that the water does not collect underneath the casualty. Eyes – protect a non-contaminated eye from splashes and rinse the injured eye with water for at least 10 minutes, irrigate the lids inside and out. Gently remove any contaminated clothing while flooding the injury. Arrange to send the casualty to hospital. Monitor vital signs, such as breathing, pulse and level of response. Caution Never attempt to neutralise acid or alkali burns unless you are trained to do so Do not delay starting treatment by searching for an antidote Do not allow the casualty to touch an injured eye Do not forcibly remove a contact lens 		
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
